The Catholic Life at St Damian's

As we start 2025, I am again delighted to report that our provision to deliver a genuine Catholic education continues and has a massive bearing on the moral and spiritual development of your child. I hope that you enjoy reading these opportunities below.

- Caritas Award. We are delighted to announce that St Damian's has been awarded a prestigious Caritas Community Engagement Award! This recognition celebrates the incredible spirit of compassion and service that defines our school family. Caritas Ambassadors are being rewarded with a special day out with bowling and lunch for all their hard work for the community. Their efforts don't stop as they are currently planning a St Valentine's Day event to support our very own Yr11 with a contribution to their prom. Well done to everyone who contributed to this wonderful achievement!
- Charity Fundraising during Advent. Thanks to your generosity and support, we raised a phenomenal **£2,196.18** through our Advent Caritas Gift Challenge and Christmas Jumper/Cosy Day! This money will be donated to Caritas Salford and will make a huge difference to the vital work they do with vulnerable people in our city. As a community we enjoyed a day of cosy own clothes, hot chocolate, photobooth pictures and much more. Days like these highlight the extraordinary kindness of our students, staff, and families. Thanks!
- Confirmation Classes. To support our Yr8 students in preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation, we have partnered with the Parish to host classes after school. These sessions will take place every Tuesday from 3:30 pm to 5:00 pm in our school hall. Please note these sessions are Parish-led through volunteers and not supervised by St Damian's staff. Last year (across two schools) 138 students were Confirmed which is a great cause for celebration. Please note that the date for the Sacrament of Confirmation with Bishop John is on 4th/5th June 2025. (Pentecost Weekend). Further details, from the parish, will follow. We are proud to support the spiritual development of our students in this way.
- *Pope's Coin.* Our local MP, The Rt Hon Angela Rayner, recently met the Pope and shared with him the importance of interfaith dialogue. During the meeting she was given a coin which she has kindly donated to St Damian's. The coin is the official medal for the twelfth year of the Pontificate of his Holiness Pope Francis. The coin is the work of Michele Celeste who also designed the medal for the eleventh year of the Pontificate. On the front of the coin is the coat of arms of the Holy Father and the reverse side of the coin depicts Jesus taking the hand of a person sinking in the water. In the background is a boat with migrants who witness this divine intervention. It shows us that through faith, God saves and safeguards the lives of those in need and those who entrust themselves to his merciful love. The coin will be displayed in our display cabinet for all to see. Thanks to Angela Rayner for kindly donating this to the school which will serve as a symbol of faith and community for years to come.



• The Year of the Jubilee. Excitement is building as we celebrate the Year of the Jubilee! Heads of Year launched this special occasion with assemblies, and form time reflections have been helping students explore its significance in the life of the Church. In addition to this, we will also welcome the Salford Diocese Jubilee Anchor to our school **6th-9th May 2025** as part of this significant event. Mrs Allmand and Mrs Gerschler will attend Diocesan meetings to ensure St Damian's fully embraces the year's celebrations.



• A great example of Service. We are incredibly proud of Elijah Nathaniel, a Yr8 student who volunteered over the festive period with Urban Outreach Bolton's "Christmas Dinner on Jesus" initiative. Elijah helped distribute over 2,000 Christmas food parcels to more than 6,500 people, starting his day at 5:30 am and working tirelessly to help others. This involved an early 5.30am start and heavy lifting but it was great to help out the community, Elijah is a true ambassador for St Damian's, living out our Catholic values of love and service. Well done, Elijah!



Safeguarding Update: Child Substance Misuse

At the start of this month, Mrs Brophy trained our staff on child substance misuse. Staff were made aware of the signs of substance misuse and the impact it has on learning. Furthermore, Mrs Brophy delivered assemblies on this topic and how to report concerns and what to do if they need support, either internally or from external professionals. I would like to take this opportunity to reiterate our safeguarding mantra that *'it could happen here'* and in fact, it does happen here. I ask that parents keep an eye on any changes in your child's behaviour which may be an indication of substance misuse.

Additionally, I urge parents to look at their children's social media posts as I have dealt with students who have posted images of themselves with or around drugs. If we are ever alerted to these posts, we will inform you as parents. I am also using this newsletter to clearly inform you that if your child is found to have illegal substances/paraphernalia on their person or indeed be under the influence in school then their place at St Damian's is at serious risk. Can I stress how important it is that parents look out for signs of substance misuse as when I speak to some parents, it is obvious that they don't know what to keep an eye open for.

Safeguarding Update: 'Use of Social Media'

Increasingly across the country there are more and more issues with the 'abuse' of Social Media. The community of St Damian's is not immune to this. An example of this is where students are posting pictures of themselves **outside** of school using drugs or brandishing weapons. Indeed, I have spoken to several parents regarding this. It is important that parents know what their children are doing on their phones in their social time. As a school we constantly educate children on a range of 'difficult' topics and the dangers of drugs or weapons. For clarity, if any child brings drugs or weapons into school, they are likely to permanently excluded.

Teaching and Learning Update

At this stage in the Teaching and Learning Cycle, all teachers have been formally observed and given written feedback via their line manager. By monitoring Teaching and Learning at St Damian's, Senior Leaders can ensure that we continue to provide quality education by actively engaging students in their learning, ensuring we are motivating them, imparting knowledge, skills and values that enable students to become lifelong learners. Teachers are also in the process of conducting their own pedagogical research, through dedicated CPD time to ensure we are at the forefront of new initiatives, new technologies and new teaching methods to continue to support our pupils to thrive. I am delighted to say that the quality of teaching at St Damian's is outstanding, as reflected by our sustained outstanding GCSE outcomes each year.



Children's Mental Health Week

This year St Damian's will be proudly supporting Children's Mental Health Week created by Place 2 Be between 3rd and 9th February. The theme this year is *'know yourself, grow yourself'* and will focus on young people understanding that it's OK to just be themselves rather than conforming to expectations. During the week our students will have the opportunity to explore the importance of self-awareness and understand how expressing

their emotions in an acceptable manner will allow them to develop. I look forward to sharing some of the highlights in my February newsletter.

Safer Internet Day

St Damian's will be taking part in 'Safer Internet' Day 2025. Supported by the Computer Science Department, our students will be educated through a range of activities, lessons and in lessons warning them about the many dangers of the internet. This will take place around the 11th of February 2025. Safer Internet Day is the UK's biggest event to raise awareness of online safety. Each year, a theme covers an issue that educates children on keeping safe. The theme this year is 'Too good to be true? Protecting yourself and others from scams online', with a focus focusing on how to protect themselves from scams.



Mobile Phone Ambassadors



At the end of last half term, six Yr10 students attended a unique training course in collaboration with the GMP school engagement officers and the Cyber Crime unit at Tameside police station. Students learnt about how safe their data is online and that we must be updating passwords and security features in our digital lives to avoid being a target for Cyber Crime. They took part in an 'escape room' style game which tested their ethical hacking skills and ability to crack codes. They had 30 minutes to complete the task, using clues, padlocks and passwords to prove the innocence of the police

officer! St Damians students

managed this in 21 minutes, beating Fairfield School for Girls and Laurus Ryecroft on the day to be the fastest school to complete the challenge. ⁶⁹ The students will now be able to share their knowledge on mobile phone safety and provide handy tips to avoid being a victim of online fraud. They were also treated to a VIP ride in the Police van down to the station and got to pick from the police tuck shop as a well done for their exceptional behaviour.



Yr11 Update

It is important that parents take interest in their child's education over the next few months. Arguably, their GCSE exams are the *most* important that they will take as these largely decide what students can, and can't, do post 16 and, indeed for the rest of their lives. Below are some 'updates' that you should be aware of.

- Mocks. Yr11 students have had their Mock exam results back a few weeks ago. I hope that parents have spoken to their child regarding these. As I have said before, parents supporting the school and taking an interest in their child's assessments is key. Note that on St Damian's day, 14th February, students will be sitting further Mock exams in English and Maths.
- Intervention. This started a few weeks ago and will continue right up to the week before the GCSE exams begin. This is an excellent opportunity for your child to boost their GCSE grades. I ask that parents support this initiative.

Revision sessions at half term: Some teachers are putting on revision sessions during the half term.

- Key to Success [K2S] Groups: Since January, we have refigured our forms to ensure targeted intervention for students to achieve better grades in English and Maths. During form time, three times a week students will be doing 'extra' Maths and English. An extra form has been created to support the creation of these targeted forms. Students not in a K2S form will have time to revise independently.

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Externally Set Assignment Update. Yr11 Art students have started work on their Externally Set Assignment

(ESA). Over the next three months, they will explore their ideas in a sketchbook before completing their final piece after Easter in 10 hours of supervised time. To achieve their targets, it is essential students are using checklists and exemplar materials to help them meet homework deadlines. Parental support in encouraging their focus and organisation during this important time will be invaluable. An example of final piece of ESA work from Vinnie Burrows, a student in last year's Yr11.

- \geq GCSE Music: Students recently took part in a dedicated NEA recording day, finalising their performance submissions for their coursework. The day provided a focused and supportive environment for students to showcase their hard work and musical talents, with a fantastic range of performances across different styles and instruments. From expressive solo pieces to well-rehearsed ensemble performances, students demonstrated impressive technical skill and musicality. Their dedication and preparation were evident, and we are incredibly proud of the high standard they achieved. A huge well done to all involved!
- \triangleright Free passes to the Prom. Each month, I will be doing several raffles for a free ticket to the Prom. Students will be rewarded simply for working hard and making great effort and/or progress and not for simply being the highest academically as this would be unfair. Thus, far, FOUR free tickets have been awarded. The children who have received are Ciara Postlethwaite [Highest attainer in Mocks], Stuart Edwards [Most progress], Ava Matthews [Most improved from Autumn progress check] and Ruby Morrell [Chosen in a raffle from positive teacher feedback]. Well done. Each month I will pick a child's name from a raffle for a free ticket.
- \triangleright Attendance. You have heard it before, but it is worth reiterating again and again and again! 😊 Attendance is a pre-requisite for effective learning. It is a fact that students with good regular attendance, achieve the best academically, but also socially. Attendance of Yr11 since the first school day in September is 93.7%. I ask that parents make every effort to ensure that their child attends. A reminder that if attendance is not good enough, your child's invitation to the Prom will be withdrawn. This has been made clear to the students. I am pleased to say that 32 students have 100% attendance, and this is fantastic!
- \triangleright Independent Study. Last week I was speaking to all the Subject Leaders in school focusing on the Mocks. One of the biggest issues or barriers to each individual child achieving their potential is the lack of independent work at home. It is vital that parents ensure their child is doing 2-3 hours EACH night. I can't stress the importance of this.
- A Note from Mrs Forde, HOY11. It has been a very busy few months for Yr11 and I am really impressed with their attitude and resilience. There were some fantastic grades achieved in the recent Mocks, which reflect their hard work and talent. It is essential that all students continue to work hard both in school and with independent study in order to reach their full potential. Have reviewe of college applications DIOCESE OF

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recently too and it is great to see the wide range of aspirations our students have. I wish them all the best with their final few months at St Damian's – time is really flying past!

Please note date of the FINAL Yr11 Parent's Evening is <u>Wednesday 26th March</u>. I ask that you make every effort to attend.

Yr10 Update

Yr10 have now completed a full term of their GCSE courses. Although the vast majority understand the importance of these 2 year courses, there are a number of students who have not yet grasped their importance. For clarity, their GCSE exams will largely determine **what they can, and what they can't** do after they leave school. Maximising their GCSEs will ensure that they have a wider range of courses and opportunities post -16. I can't stress the importance of working hard this year as a springboard for commencing Yr11. Below are some key messages for parents and students alike.

- Progress Checks. You should have received your child's most recent progress check. This will give an
 indication of how your child is progressing in school. I trust that you have spoken to your child regarding
 these. It is important to understand that GCSEs are linear exams and the learning now is part of their
 preparations for their GCSE exams at the end of year 11.
- GCSE targets. Targets have now been set that are aspirational, yet realistic, and designed to motivate students to achieve their best potential. I ask that you discuss these targets with your child. Please note that these targets will be reviewed in Yr11 and adjusted if necessary to reflect progress and individual circumstances.
- Attendance. The attendance of Yr10 since the first school day in September is 93.7%, attendance should be at least 97%. I am pleased to say that 26 students have 100% attendance, and this is fantastic! As in all years, it is crucial that attendance is at least good as this is a major factor in the determination of GCSE success/outcomes.

A reminder that the Yr10 Parents' Evening is on Wednesday 12th February. Please make every effort to attend.

Yr9 Options

This is an exciting time for Yr9 as they prepare to choose their GCSE subjects. This milestone marks the beginning of an important phase in their education, allowing them to tailor their learning to suit their strengths, interests, and future aspirations. Mrs Kelly will be launching the Options process after February half-term with a range of activities including assemblies and taster sessions. This will be followed by an informative Options Evening, led by Mrs Kelly, which will take place on **Thursday 20th March at 6pm**. I look forward to seeing you on the evening so that you can understand the process, it's an opportunity to ask questions and allows you to support your child at this very important juncture.

Yr 8 Parents' Evening

Again, this evening was a huge success. It really is great to see a real buzz in the school hall with happy students, staff and parents. Spotlight on Roxy McHugh, Yr10





Training future History Teachers

As you are aware, St Damian's is a school that trains potential teachers.
