## Catholicity at St Damian's

**Dear Parents and Carers** 

As always, the Catholic life of the school and opportunities for formation, in terms of the range and quality of provision is, simply, fantastic. I give an overview of these below;



Interfaith Week. A few weeks ago we celebrated Interfaith Week, which promoted respect and understanding between different religions. Students and staff participated in an Interfaith Afternoon Tea, learning about the beliefs and practices of other faiths. This celebration embraces diversity in our community, fostering a culture of inclusivity and living out The St Damian's Way.

Day of the Dead - Art for our Chapel. Our

students recently engaged in a creative project for the chapel, exploring the vibrant traditions of Día de los Muertos through Art. Día de los Muertos, or Day of the Dead, is a Mexican festival where families remember and celebrate their loved ones who have passed away, with colourful decorations, special foods, and by sharing happy memories. Using a range of textiles and embroidery techniques, they crafted original designs inspired by both their own identities and the colourful



symbolism of this Mexican celebration. This chapel art display brightened our Chapel and helped to deepen students' appreciation for the traditions that connect us across cultures.



 Diwali Celebrations. In October we celebrated the festive spirit of Diwali, the Hindu Festival of Lights, celebrated by millions worldwide. In partnership with our friends at the local Hindu Mandir, our students learned about Diwali's themes of

light triumphing over darkness and goodness over evil, which resonate with our Christian values. As part of the event, students created rangoli designs, enjoyed traditional Diwali sweets and



Indian snacks and listened to traditional music. Our visitors were so impressed with our presentation of Diwali and our students embraced the opportunity to experience a different culture.

Remembrance Day. This was a moving tribute to honour those who have served and sacrificed for peace. On 11th November, members of our school community gathered at our Bereavement Garden, creating a solemn and respectful atmosphere. Our entire school observed a twominute silence at 11:00 am, followed by a service. Our Cadets, Guides, and Scouts, dressed proudly in their uniforms and the GIFT Team led the readings beautifully, sharing words that











resonated with everyone present and reminded us of the immense sacrifices made for our freedom.

- RED Wednesday. On 15th November, we observed RED Wednesday, a special day dedicated to raising awareness about the persecution of Christians around the world. Students and staff wore a red accessory to show solidarity with those who suffer for their faith. Sister Roseline shared a moving reflection on the struggles faced by Christians in Nigeria.
- Catholic Social Teaching Yr10 Letters. In RE lessons, students have been learning about Catholic Social Teaching (CST) and putting it into practice by writing heartfelt letters to members of staff, expressing gratitude for their commitment to students' education and wellbeing. These letters have touched staff deeply, and the experience has taught our Yr10 students the profound impact that simple acts of kindness can have on someone's day. One of the best aspects of this activity was watching the students' expressions as they delivered their letters in person. Their smiles reflected the joy of serving others and the meaningful connections that small gestures can create.
- Yr7 Stewardship in Action: Homework. Yr7 students have been putting their learning into action with an exciting 'Stewardship in Action' homework project over half term. As part of their RE
  - lessons, students chose a stewardship task to complete at home or in their community. The options encouraged them to think about caring for the environment or supporting those in need. From creating poems and posters about stewardship to donating to local food banks and researching CAFOD and CARITAS campaigns, students engaged in activities that highlighted the importance of social responsibility. Some students conducted energy surveys at home, explored fairtrade, did litter picks in their local areas or donated items to charity shops. Each task helped students gain practical experience in environmental and social stewardship, living out *Catholic Social Teaching* in meaningful ways. Students presented their experiences in a "Show and Tell"



- session during their RE lessons in the week beginning 4th November. This showcase allowed them to reflect on their actions, learn from each other, and see the positive impact that small acts of stewardship can make. The RE team were very proud their enthusiasm in caring for others. Well done!
- Advent Preparations. As Advent gets closer, our school is full of excitement as we prepare for this special time of waiting. Our RE and GIFT Teams are planning special assemblies and reflections to help us all get ready for Christmas with open hearts. This Advent, we're focusing on the theme of 'Hope' as we look forward to the coming of Jesus. It's a wonderful way for us to feel closer to God and share the joy of this season together!

# Safeguarding. Educating the St Damian's Community on 'Domestic Abuse'

Over the past few weeks both students and staff have been educated on the hard-hitting topic of 'Domestic Abuse'. Mrs Brophy has sensitively delivered this topic to everyone as it is prevalent in society and highly prevalent in Tameside. Sadly, our community is not immune to this. Children and young people are 'damaged' if they see, hear or experience domestic abuse and it is the duty of all adults in school to support our students if they disclose that domestic abuse occurs in their homes. #### The 'Significant Ten'

A new initiative introduced by Mrs Brophy, who leads on ensuring our more disadvantaged pupils thrive at St Damian's, is the introduction of the 'Significant 10' in each year. Each Head of Year [HOY] has identified 10 key students in their year who they believe have the potential to excel in their academic studies with 'added' support of staff. During the year these students will be observed, mentored and guided by their HOY to support them in their studies. This initiative is about building confidence and becoming resilient, as well as building relationships with staff. The 'Significant 10' have been introduced to each other and parents informed. I am hoping that some of their successes will be celebrated in this newsletter throughout the year! Watch this space!

#### Yr11 Update

Firstly, I am delighted to report that the vast majority of Yr11 are working really hard in school, and they should be congratulated. However, a significant number of Yr11 students are not working to the best of their ability at home and this will be reflected in their grades next August that will have a massive bearing on their futures. I ask that parents support us by ensuring your child is working hard at home. I have said before, and I will repeat, 'there is NO substitute for hard work'.

- ✓ Half term revision. Although this was deliberately limited to a few subjects/teachers, nonetheless it was a great success. All teachers, Miss Joyce, Mrs D'Rozario and Mr Gregory were impressed with both the turnout and attitude of the students. There will be more revision opportunities during the February half term.
- ✓ Independent Learning at Home. It is imperative that parents are supporting their children and ensuring, as a minimum, their child is doing sufficient work at home [2 3 hours], a quiet space to study and to take an 'interest' in their studies. Please don't under-estimate the influence you can have on their motivation to achieve well.











- ✓ Attendance. I have said it before, but it worth repeating again (and again). Good regular attendance is vital for your child to achieve their potential. The attendance of Yr11 students from the first day in September to 26<sup>th</sup> November was 94.1%. The school target is above 97% and I ask that parents support good attendance at school. Rarely do students 'catch-up' on work missed.
- ✓ Mock Exams. These started on Wednesday 27th Nov and go on until Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> Dec with the main written exams taking place Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> December to Friday 13<sup>th</sup> December. These Mock exams replicate the exams in May/June. If your child does not attend one or more exams, they will get **zero** for that part of the exam.
- ✓ Mock Exams Results Day. This will take place on Friday 17<sup>th</sup> January at 2.30. Again, this experience will reflect what will happen on the real results day. It is important that your child is preparing for these by studying each evening for between 2 3 hours in a quiet place that is conducive to learning.
- ✓ Prom. The date for the Prom is Friday 27<sup>th</sup> June. However, students must have good punctuality and a good work rate to be invited. If your child is excluded more than once, then they will be excluded from attending the Prom. Sadly, a small number of students have had their invitation withdrawn. At the start of next term, I will be rewarding one student a month with a free ticket to the Prom for showing exceptional work each month for January, February, March, April and May. Watch this space ...
- ✓ Prefects. We have recently reviewed who of our Yr11 students are now working well enough to be awarded a Prefect tie. Standards remain high and only those students with excellent attendance, no behavioural issues and a recent positive progress check have been selected. These students should be congratulated, as they are clearly excellent role models within the St Damian's community. There will be one final opportunity for Yr11s to become a Prefect at the end of January, following their mock results. Keep striving to do your best!
- ✓ Parents Evening. This was a resounding success. Thanks to all the parents who attended. It was great to see so many there, creating a positive vibe. The responses from the questionnaires showed that we have the overwhelming support from parents. This partnership is very strong, and in the final analysis, this will ensure that your child has the best chance to achieve their potential. Out of 112 questionnaires completed, 111 would recommend the school. Only 1 parent would not recommend the school. The comments, all of which will be on the website for your perusal were, were great to read and I have shared with the staff. Thanks! We don't take this support for granted. Some of these comments are below.

This year group has the real potential to do extremely well and smash previous outcomes. With hard work, resilience, supportive parents and a 'believe to achieve' attitude they will. I wish them nothing but the best in their Mocks and their GCSE exams in May/June.

#### **SLT Assemblies Early November**

At the beginning of November SLT delivered all the assemblies in school to impart key messages to our students. Below is a brief overview of the Key Messages delivered.

- ✓ Yr11. I delivered an assembly on 'Believe To Achieve', which is the unofficial mantra of St. Damian's. The main messages were that students need to believe in themselves and their ability and that every child, regardless of ability can achieve. I also stressed the importance of working hard and having routines each day to enable effective revision.
- Yr10. The senior leader link for Yr10, Mrs Heenan, delivered an assembly on the four 'behaviours' of successful people. The emphasis was that success was not necessarily down to talent itself, but rather having the following four behaviours: Being pro-active, being prosocial and collaborate, being disciplined and being determined. If you embrace these 4 behaviours, you are more likely to succeed.
- ✓ Yr9. Mrs Kelly explored the theme of forgiveness, linking it to the gospel message of "love thy neighbour as yourself." She shared insights on how forgiveness plays a crucial role in building stronger, more compassionate communities. Mrs Kelly expanded on this idea, reflected on how communities often come together during times of tragedy, but also highlighted the power of forgiveness, quoting: "It is not an easy journey, to get to a place where you forgive people. But it is such a powerful place because it frees you." This message reminded us that while forgiveness can be challenging, it is essential for personal and communal healing.
- Yr8. Mrs Brophy delivered on the theme of 'kindness', inspired by Luke 6:35 'But love your enemies, and do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return, and your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he is kind to the ungrateful and the evil'. Kindness is something that we all have, and the message was that being kind does make others feel good, but also gives a sense of self-fulfilment when you do something for others without being asked. Mrs Brophy encouraged Yr8 to carry out a random act of kindness. The children watched a short animation on 'taking their hands out of their pockets' to free them up to help others, something we could all learn to do!
- ✓ Yr7. Ms. Joyce delivered on the theme of 'Community & Forgiveness', linking with the Gospel theme of the week, where Jesus reminded the people to 'Love thy neighbour, as yourself.' Yr7 are now full members St Damian's community and this means that as part of the same community we need to learn to forgive one another. Yr7 agreed that forgiveness was often hard but that being able to forgive people helps us to stay happy and be grateful for people we have in our lives.

#### **SEND Updates**

Spotlight on SEND. Each Thursday morning, a pupil with additional needs is the focus of a cross-curricular staff meeting. Staff who work with the pupil meet to discuss their needs, share updates and focus on how best to support the child's progress. This team approach will really ensure that the pupils have the most effective support possible.











Revision Strategy Session. With Yr11 mocks fast approaching, students with additional needs were invited to a session on revision strategies and given a comprehensive 'study pack' with essential revision stationery. One revision technique shown was the *Pomodoro* technique, which is a time-management method. A revision planning timetable was also shared to help students to make effective use of their time. Students were more confident about how to revise and



how to use their time well. Mrs Walker said "Good luck to them in their mocks"

## Stretching the More Able in Yr10 Maths



Mr Wilson and Mr McCallion are stretching Yr10 Maths more able with after school sessions on Grade 8 - 9 style questions from the GCSE curriculum, covering more challenging topics, such as equations of circles and differentiation. This cohort consists of approximately 20 students. There will also be coverage of some A Level curriculum topics. These sessions will continue into Yr11 and are designed to support their attempts to achieve Grade 9 in

their GCSE in 2026. There are also plans to sit the Further Maths examination in Yr11. And it will culminate in these pupils sitting a Further Maths examination in Yr11.

#### **Debate CLUB**

The month of November saw Mr Gregory relaunch of the St Damian's 'Debate Club' with our current Yr8 students. This club gives our students the chance to debate ethical topics that have been chosen by them in front of an audience made up of their peers. It also gives students the chance to improve their confidence skills by presenting their argument to a large audience and be prepared to answer questions. The first debate of the year was entitled "whether the election of Donald Trump is a force for good". The outcome, by a narrow margin, was that his election could have negative consequences on issues like our climate. Our next debate is on Friday the 29<sup>th</sup> November "Do we have anything to fear from the increase in AI technology?"

#### **Duke of Edinburgh [DoE] Update**



This term, students in Yr9 and Yr10 were given the opportunity to apply to complete their Bronze & Silver DoE award. Every year, this fantastic programme provides students with unforgettable experiences and develops skills, such as teamwork, communication, resilience, leadership, and organisation. This year, the written

applications were of an exceptionally high calibre and far more applied than there were spaces available. However, 32 students in Yr9 and 32 students in Yr10 have been awarded a place. There will be registration sessions after school for each group:

- Bronze Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> December 3:10 4:00pm (Room 28)





## London 2025 Update
