- Mock Results. These will be given out to students on Friday 17th January at 2.30. I ask that parents follow up with their children what they achieved in their exams.
- Attendance. Attendance is key to success in their forthcoming exams, and we ask all parents to support good regular attendance. If your child has a minor ailment, they should still come to school, where possible, and we will support. Letters have been sent out to individual students who are at risk of serious underachievement due to poor attendance.

- Intervention. A planned and comprehensive program of revision will commence after the Christmas break. I ask that parents support this initiative. It is an excellent opportunity for your child. See the table below. There will also be additional intervention during the breaks and on the Saturdays before the exams. This will be communicated in due course.
- Parents' Evening. An 'extra' parents' evening is taking place on Wednesday 26th March 4 7pm.
 This will be the final opportunity for you to meet with subject teachers before the GCSEs and gain up to date information on the areas for development for your child.
- Literacy Hub. This is available for Yr11 for quiet study and homework completion. Revision guides
 are available on request from the school library and the set texts for Literature are available on our
 digital library SORA. I ask that if your child is not in a formal intervention class that they make use
 of this resource.
- Remember. There is no substitute for hard work. All students should now be in an established routine at home. We recommend that pupils should be completing between 2 and 3 hours of independent study each evening, using revision guides, past papers, etc. This will help ease stress in the long term in the lead up to the GCSEs in May.

Finally, Yr11 students must have a well-deserved rest over the Christmas break, ready to start working hard at the start of January towards their exams in May/June.


Awards

into the festive spirit by adding decorations and lots of glitter. Students are enjoying Art Club so much that they are already asking how to become an Art Leader, however the role is only for




Santa Dash
