5 steps to know how to float

However you end up in the water, if you end up in difficulty, Float to Live.



• Water Safety. Tragically, every year we see young people lose their lives when they are tempted to get in to open waters as the temperature rises. Children have had an assembly on the dangers of going in rivers, reservoirs and canals. The Fire Service provide great information on the hazards associated with water and I urge you to look at their website

The 2 most important things that children should know are: If they see someone in danger in the water use the 'CALL, TELL, THROW' advice shared in assembly and if they themselves find themselves in trouble use the FLOAT TO LIVE technique.

Derelict/Unoccupied Buildings. Empty buildings often attract young people because they are
quiet and provide somewhere for them to explore. Very often these buildings are unsafe and
condemned, accidents have been recorded where children have fallen through roofs or where
they have hurt themselves on debris and sharp waste materials. Derelict buildings and

building sites are not open to the public and the police may become involved if your child is found trespassing, please explain the dangers to your child.



Supporting the team with silver and bronze placings were Hollie McHugh high jump, Thea Brophy 1500m, Laura Jarzynska Long Jump and the junior girls finished 2nd in the 4 x 100m relay. The boys also did St Damian's proud with a very respectable 3rd place overall, behind 2 strong all boys

healthy independent lives.



Given that this theme dovetailed perfectly with the recent General Election, 10LGY chose to run a mock election for our form assembly with various members of the form representing the five main parties. In the hope of gaining their peers vote, the would-be politicians each read part of the main parties' manifestos before the remainder of Yr10 were invited to cast their vote. The results were as follows: Conservative party (4 votes), Labour Party (59 votes), Liberal Democrats (4 votes), Reform party (50 votes) and the Green Party (12 votes). In a follow-up activity, students were requested to indicate 'why they chose to vote for their party of choice'? The survey showed many of our students are politically engaged as they referenced themes such as 'National Service, NHS, Immigration and the Environment' as the motivating factors behind their votes.

National Awards

As we end another academic year, I am delighted to say that we have done well in another couple of national award ceremonies. Although we didn't win, we are proud that our nominations were recognised.



- TES School Awards 'Staff Wellbeing of the Year'. Dubbed the 'Oscars of Education' we were privileged to be a finalist in this year's TES School Awards. This category celebrates the exemplary work that we do to support our wonderful staff. It is critical we celebrate excellence and share it widely so we can ensure that the fantastic work happening in education is properly recognised." - Pearson National Teaching Awards 'Making a Difference Secondary School of the Year'. We

 communities across the UK. This category celebrates secondary schools with "an established
 record of good academic outcomes, an asset to the wider community and is well respected by
 parents and key partners. It demonstrates power and effectiveness in transforming the life
 chances of learners and enriches the local community."

Trip to Jodrell Trip Observatory

A group of 50 students from Yr9 and Yr10 enjoyed an out of this world experience visiting Jodrell Bank Observatory, a world-learning science research institute and UNESCO World Heritage Site. They listened to a fascinating talk about the Lovell Telescope, where they heard how the Cold War and the beginning of the Space Race accelerated its construction in the 1950's. Students were able to touch a real meteorite and observe their own radiation via an infrared camera as they toured fantastic exhibits. The Space Dome session at the end of the trip was a firm favourite, with students able to sit back and watch the history of the Universe played out on a huge screen all around them. For Yr9, this trip served to inspire and enhance their knowledge of space research prior to studying Separate Science Physics GCSE next year. Mrs Robinson said it was "a great trip with our fantastic students"!















History London Trip



Early in July, 53 Yr10 students and 7 staff had a wonderful whistle-stop tour of major London attractions. This included the Science Museum which will be helpful with our Medicine Through Time GCSE topic. Then the group visited the Imperial War Museum where we saw artefacts from across a wide range of time and conflicts and of course the Lord Ashcroft Special collection. A big highlight was The Tower of London with over a

millennium of History to look at, focusing mainly on the White Tower which is the main Norman

building with Tudor developments. While in the Tower, staff and students took the time to examine the stunning Crown Jewels. Mr McHugh said the "superb students let nothing daunt them, and despite the appalling weather and a cancelled boat trip it didn't stop them having a great time".



History Staff Profile

We have a superb History department and GCSE outcomes are very strong. Following on from the success of the London trip I decided to profile this department.

- Mr McHugh. After school Mr McHugh attended a local college and did a Higher National Certificate in Business Studies, saying to this day he has no idea how he passed the Accountancy part of the course! During studying at the University of Glasgow, one summer he worked in a kitchen in Delaware, in the United States, leaving him with a life-long love of eating in restaurants. Other summers were spent working as a postman to raise money needed to have a good time at university. He says his interest in teaching was when BP were looking for people to go into deprived areas of Glasgow and encourage young people to embrace their education. After university he completed a PGCE and got his first teaching job in a deprived area in Middlesbrough. Although challenging, he loved it saying everyone was football mad. He worked in three other schools before starting at St Damian's in 2007. He says he has loved every minute of his time here. When not in work, he watches football and supports Kilmarnock and Scotland and relaxes with his wife by seeing lots of shows
- Mr Gregory. Mr Gregory has been teaching History at St Damian's for the past 11 years. Prior to this role he worked as an archaeologist for the University of Manchester and was lucky enough to work on sites from a range of periods ranging from the Romans, the industrial revolution and even in the Andes of Peru. He says working at St Damians is a pleasure as it allows him to foster a love of history in our students, with the hope that some of them will go on to develop careers in this field and enjoy similar experiences to that of his own.
- Mrs Taylor. As a former pupil of St Damian's, Mrs Taylor says she has been lucky to be part of this community for many years. She attended Ashton Sixth Form College where she studied History, Sociology and RE, before studying History at the University of Manchester. This was followed by a PGCE (teacher training) at Edge Hill University. When a job became available at St Damian's, she couldn't miss out on the opportunity as she knew she wanted to return. Mrs Taylor has worked here for 10 years and says she loves coming to work each day saying she feels extremely lucky to work in such a supportive department and school and that the students here are wonderful, and every day is different. Although teaching is challenging it is also an extremely rewarding job and Mrs Taylor is confident that it is a career she will be sticking












with for the rest of her working life. Outside of work, she enjoys spending quality time with her baby boy and socialising with friends and family.

Curriculum Updates

Yr10 GCSE Music: Students recently completed their solo and ensemble performance recordings, an essential part of their assessment. Mr McArdle was delighted the recordings went exceptionally well, reflecting the tremendous effort and talent of our students; they have dedicated countless hours to practice, mastering a variety of instruments including guitar, vocals, piano and drums. Mr McArdle is to be commended for fostering a nurturing and challenging environment, providing expert feedback and coordinating numerous practice schedules. I look forward to excellent GCSE outcomes next year.



• Geography Field Trip. On Friday 28th June, Yr10 Geography students attended their compulsory field trip to Crosby Beach. This trip is a fundamental part of the geography GCSE, as the pupils will be assessed on their knowledge and understanding of the geographical enquiry process in the Paper 3

exam next summer. They were tasked with collecting geographical data to assess the effectiveness of the coastal defences along the Crosby coastline. During their time at the coast, students conducted an environmental quality survey and a questionnaire to gather evidence for their enquiry question. Additionally, students enjoyed exploring the artwork by Antony Gormley on the beach. The collected data will now be analysed and evaluated during lessons to determine the overall effectiveness of the sea defences.

 Yr10 Drama GCSE. These students recently completed a series of recordings for their devising projects, showcasing their immense talent and creativity. The process involved collaborative brainstorming, scriptwriting, rehearsing, and ultimately performing their pieces for the recordings.













They embraced the challenge with creativity and determination, resulting in an impressive array of performances that highlight their growth and skills in drama.

Each group brought a different perspective and energy to their projects, making for a diverse and engaging collection of work. Miss Brookes said the "dedication and enthusiasm demonstrated by every student was truly commendable". I am looking forward to great GCSE outcomes next year.

 Computer Science: Mr Tabas welcomed C Murray, Senior Professional Development Leader in STEM Learning Ltd. back to review our progress in implementing the KS3 Computer Science Curriculum. I am delighted to inform you that she agreed that we are meeting level 3 for the Computing Quality Framework. This has taken a lot of hard work, the department and the pupils. This has put us at or above the national standard in all areas of Computing and we are delighted by this. Moving forward, she has set the rigorous target of achieving level 4 and certification by February of next year.



• STEM. A few weeks ago several Yr9 students attended a STEM Club taster session. Our fabulous Yr10 STEM leaders have been outstanding in their role this year, demonstrating

great practical, teamwork and leadership skills. They were keen to pass on their knowledge to the Yr9 students who had a great time conducting starch tests on



leaves. Mrs Robinson thanked the current Yr10 leaders for all their hard work but now is the time to pass the baton on to the new STEM leaders for the next academic year. The current STEM leaders will be focusing on their GCSEs next year.

Peer Readers As you know, senior leaders and other staff have reading groups throughout the year. But we also have an additional 7 wonderful Yr10 students who have volunteered to become 'peer readers'. These Yr10 students are paired up with a Yr7 student for peer reading sessions over the academic year.



When Mrs Heenan has tested their reading ages this month, she was delighted to see significant progress. She said that the "commitment that our Yr10s have shown those students has been second to none. They have listened to Yr7 reading, encouraged them with prompts regarding intonation and helped them understand difficult vocabulary".

Most importantly, they have built up their confidence. Mrs

Heenan presented these Yr10 students with a little reward for their dedication and time. This successful initiative, our 'Peer Reading Programme', will continue in the next academic year.


- Ms Ali is moving onto pastures new and is closer to home so she can spend more time with her
